The University of Iowa has been a leading center of graduate education since the turn of the 20th century. Advanced degrees in nearly 100 areas are offered to the graduate student population, which makes up approximately one-fifth of the University's total enrollment.

We are proud of the excellence of our academic programs and believe that our students find the University and the Iowa City community a satisfying and rewarding place to further their education.

The Admission Process

This application is designed for prospective graduate students who plan to pursue a graduate program. (To apply online, go to www.uiowa.edu/admissions/applications/graduate.)

Refer to page 3 for information about where to send application materials. **Application materials must be sent to two different University offices: the Office of Admissions and your academic department.**

Minimum Requirements

These are general minimum requirements of the Graduate College; those of individual departments may be higher. Applicants must have:

- a U.S. bachelor's degree from a regionally accredited college or university, or an equivalent degree from another country as determined by the Office of Admissions; and
- a minimum grade-point average (GPA) of 3.00, or foreign equivalent as determined by the Office of Admissions.

Application Deadlines

Applications and academic records are due in the Office of Admissions no later than:

- fall semester (August through December)—July 15
- winter interim (December & January)—Dec. 1
- spring semester (January through May)—Dec. 1
- summer sessions (May to June/June through July)—April 15

Note that applications and academic records for international students are due in the Office of Admissions no later than:

- fall semester (August through December)—April 15
- winter interim (December & January)—Oct. 1
- spring semester (January through May)—Oct. 1
- summer sessions (June through July)—March 1

These are general Graduate College deadlines. **Most departments and programs, however, establish earlier deadlines, which will appear in their departmental materials.** Mailing your completed application (including supporting materials) so that it arrives three to four weeks prior to the departmental deadline will allow your application to receive the greatest consideration.

Joint Programs

College of Law/Graduate College

The College of Law and many graduate departments offer joint programs leading to the Juris Doctor (JD) degree and a graduate degree. Applicants must meet College of Law admissions requirements in addition to those of the Graduate College.

College of Medicine/Graduate College

College of Pharmacy/Graduate College

- PharmD/MPH (Master of Public Health)

School of Management/Graduate College

Applicants must complete the *School of Management Application for Admission* in addition to the *Application for Graduate Admission*.

- Business Administration (MBA)/Nursing; and
- Business Administration (MBA)/Health Management & Policy.

Graduate Programs

Application Instructions

Please print legibly in ink. Most items on this application are self-explanatory. Instructions for the others follow.

A. Personal Information

A1-3. **Name**—List your name as you would like it to appear on all University records. (International students: list your name as it appears in your passport.) If your name changes prior to your enrollment, please notify the Office of Admissions in writing.

A4. **Social Security Number (SSN)**—We will use your SSN to verify your identity for record-keeping purposes and to help match transcripts and other materials with your admission application. It will not be used as your student ID number. Your SSN will be safeguarded by the University and will not be displayed on official records or made available to others. If you do not have an SSN, leave this item blank.

A8-9. **Current Mailing Addresses**—Complete these three lines as you would address an envelope to be mailed to yourself.

From August 15 through May 15, we will correspond with you at your current address. From May 16 through August 14, your home address will be used. If either address changes, please notify the Office of Admissions. International students will receive correspondence at their residing address at all times.

A12-13. **Citizenship**—If you are a permanent resident of the United States, submit a copy of your Permanent Resident (green) Card. If you mark “other,” you must provide your immigration status (e.g., refugee, asylee, applicant for Permanent Resident Card) and country of citizenship.

International applicants must indicate their country of citizenship and the nonimmigrant visa type they intend to hold while enrolled at the University.

A14. **Racial/Ethnic/Tribal Affiliation Information**—Your response to this item is voluntary (international students may proceed to the next item). In order to comply with U.S. Department of Education regulations concerned with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act, The University of Iowa must report statistical summaries of the student body. This information is held confidential and does not appear on academic records. Information regarding individual students is not supplied outside the University without the student’s written consent. The following are definitions of the categories listed.

1. Alaskan Native or American Indian: a person having origins in any of the original peoples of North America who maintains cultural identification through tribal affiliation or community identification.
2. African American/Black: a person having origins in any of the black racial groups of Africa, not of Hispanic origin.
3. Hispanic/Latino(a): a person of Mexican, Puerto Rican, Cuban, Central or South American, or other Spanish culture or origin, regardless of race.
4. Asian or Pacific Islander: a person having origins in any of the original peoples of the Far East, Southeast Asia, the Indian Subcontinent, or the Pacific Islands. This area includes, for example, China, Japan, Korea, India, the Philippine Islands, and Samoa.
5. White, not of Hispanic/Latino(a) origin: a person having origins in any of the original peoples of Europe, North Africa, or the Middle East.

B. Admission Information

B1. **Session**—Indicate the month and year of the first session in which you intend to enroll. Your admission is valid only for the session designated in your admission letter. If you are unable to register for that session, but wish to enroll at a later time, departmental approval must be initiated by requesting a change of session from the Office of Admissions.

B2-3. **Department and Degree Objective**—Please choose **one** program/department and an appropriate degree objective from the list of Graduate Programs on pages 6-8. List the department and indicate the appropriate department code. (When writing to an academic department, be sure to use the program name and campus address as it appears on this list.)

Students cannot be considered for admission to two or more programs/departments at the same time **unless** they are applying for an approved joint program (see list on page 1).

C. Educational Data

C1. **Postsecondary Education**—Omission or misrepresentation of information concerning enrollment in other colleges or universities is sufficient grounds for canceling one’s admission or registration.

Official copies of all academic records/transcripts of course work completed are required. (Current or former University of Iowa students do not need to request their University of Iowa record or any other transcripts previously submitted to the University.) Credentials submitted for admission become the property of the University and are not returnable or transferable. U.S. and Canadian transcripts must arrive in a sealed envelope mailed directly from the institution.

Academic records from other countries must bear the true stamp or seal of the university and signature of a school official (e.g., registrar, dean, or controller of examinations).

- Academic records must include your years of attendance; the subjects you studied by year; the number of credits or units or weekly lecture and laboratory hours for each subject; grades, marks, or percentages earned in each course or year-end examinations; and diplomas, titles, degrees, or certificates awarded.
- Documents not in English must be accompanied by complete, literal English translations certified by your university. Photocopies without this certification will not be considered official.
- The Diploma Supplement should be submitted along with the complete official academic records and degree certificates with literal English translations from institutions that have implemented the Bologna Declaration. The Diploma Supplement alone is insufficient.

C2. **GRE**—Although some departments may admit students before their GRE scores are received, the Graduate College requires that scores be on file before the end of your first session of registration. The Office of Admissions must receive an official score report directly from the testing agency. Departments that require or recommend a GRE Subject Test will notify you in their materials. The University’s GRE code is 6681. For information, go to www.gre.org.

C3. **GMAT**—The Graduate Management Admission Test (GMAT) is required for some programs in business. The University’s GMAT code is 6681. For information, go to www.gmac.com.

C4. **TOEFL**—The Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) is required of all international applicants who are non-native speakers of English. This requirement is automatically waived for applicants who have completed a bachelor’s degree (or higher) at an accredited university in the United States, the United Kingdom, Canada (excluding French Quebec), Africa (English speaking), Australia, or New Zealand. The University’s TOEFL code is 6681. For information, go to www.toefl.com.

D. Departmental Information

D1. **Letters of Recommendation**—These persons should be acquainted with the scope and quality of your academic achievements and should be able to address your ability to complete a graduate degree at The University of Iowa. Ask your recommenders to use your full name as it appears on your application.

D5. **Cumulative GPAs**—For example, 3.22 on a 4.00 scale. If your institution did not use a 4.00 grading scale, provide your overall grade average and the scale used (e.g., 8.5 on a 10-point scale; 65% on a 100 scale; Second Class First Division).

G. Statement in Determination of Residency

The classification of residents and nonresidents for admission and tuition purposes is based upon information furnished by you. The registrar is authorized to require additional evidence as deemed necessary to verify your status. Address questions to the Office of the Registrar, 1 Jessup Hall, 319-335-0217.

H1-2. Supplemental Application Information for International Students

This section is to be completed by international applicants only. The information you give us will be reported to SEVIS. Federal guidelines require that you give us a permanent foreign home address. This is the address you will return to when you finish your studies in the United States.

J. Certification

Your signature verifies that all information contained in your application is factually correct and complete.

International students, in addition, are verifying that they understand that the purpose of Item K—*Financial Statement for International Applicants* is to prevent financial difficulties after enrolling in the University, that the University cannot be expected to provide financial assistance, and that health and accident insurance is required.

K. Financial Statement for International Applicants

Once recommended for admission, applicants from other countries must submit evidence of adequate financial support to cover the costs of one full year of study at The University of Iowa before a *Certificate of Eligibility* (I-20 or DS-2019) will be issued. Graduate research or teaching assistantships may be used to satisfy the financial requirement. Students with dependents must include additional financial support for any dependents who accompany them.

Refer to the 2005–2006 Estimated Costs on page 5 in order to complete this portion of the application. If the information necessary to complete your financial statement is not available at the time of your application, you may submit Item K—*Financial Statement for International Applicants* separately at a later date. Be sure to attach the appropriate attested supporting documents. Your admission cannot be finalized without proper certification of financial ability to provide support.

Information for International Graduate Students

Location and Locale

The University is located in Iowa City, Iowa, just 50 miles west of the Mississippi River. Iowa City's population is approximately 62,000. Several major urban centers (including Chicago, Minneapolis, St. Louis, and Kansas City) are within a four- to six-hour drive.

An ideal home away from home, Iowa City is a community of learning with a sense of social responsibility and an appreciation for natural and aesthetic beauty. Iowa City blends the vibrant University campus and the natural beauty of the Iowa River with nearby shopping and residential areas. Primarily a pedestrian campus, most of the University's 125 buildings are grouped in a compact area spanning both sides of the Iowa River.

The University's tree-lined campus is adjacent to downtown Iowa City, where there are book stores, coffee shops, restaurants, music shops, and movie theaters. Downtown stores border a pedestrian mall that is alive at lunchtime with entertainment, discussions, and vendors with food carts.

Iowa has four distinct seasons: summer (June through early September), fall (through mid-November), winter (through early March), and spring. Students coming to Iowa should be prepared for all extremes of weather. The average annual precipitation is a little less than one meter. Summers are warm and humid, with temperatures ranging between 25 and 31 degrees Celsius. Winters are blustery with temperatures averaging -5 degrees Celsius, occasionally dropping as low as -18 degrees.

Support Services

The Office of International Students and Scholars (OISS) has University-wide responsibility for advisory services to international students. Staff members offer advice and assistance intended to help students make a successful adjustment to University and community life, ensuring that their educational experiences are as relevant and rewarding as possible.

The OISS staff includes professional international student advisors who assist students from other countries during their stay in Iowa City. Services include providing immigration information and other legal services, and providing initial orientation, ongoing information, and advice in order to facilitate students' adjustment to the United States and to the University.

New international students receive important information concerning housing, health care, registration procedures, and other matters of immediate concern during the orientation period. In addition to orientation, OISS promotes various activities throughout the year. These include workshops, seminars, cultural activities, and other educational and social programs designed to enrich the learning experience of international and U.S. students alike.

There are also approximately 25 student nationality associations on campus. OISS works with these groups to design and implement activities to bring students together so that they can learn about, from, and with each other.

Libraries and Computers

The University operates one of the largest research library systems in the country. The system includes the Main Library, 11 departmental libraries, and the Law Library with more than four million volumes, including many special collections.

Making computers available to every student is a goal the University takes seriously. Students have access to more than 1,200 workstations in 26 locations throughout the campus. For those wishing to own their own computers, the University's computer-purchase program allows students to buy computers at a discount price on a time-payment plan.

Where to Live

Upon arrival in Iowa City, you will find practical information about living with a roommate, locating off-campus housing, leases, furniture, and household goods from the following sources:

- *Handbook for Foreign Students and Scholars* published by OISS;
- international student orientation program;
- Housing Clearinghouse (located in the Iowa Memorial Union), which maintains lists of off-campus rooms and apartments as well as lists of students who would like to share a rental unit with one or more other students; and
- Tenant/Landlord Association (also located in the Iowa Memorial Union).

In addition, currently enrolled international students often help new arrivals find a place to live off campus. The University cannot make any advance arrangements to reserve off-campus housing for students.

University Apartments

The University has about 700 unfurnished efficiency, one-, and two-bedroom apartments for students. Current rental rates range from \$400 to \$535 per month, depending upon the unit's size and features. Gas and electricity are not included in the rent. Apartment leases run for 12 months. English Language Requirements

All applicants whose native language is not English must submit results of the Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) as part of the application process. Automatic waivers of the TOEFL requirement are granted for persons who have completed a bachelor's degree (or higher) at an accredited university in the United States, United Kingdom, Canada (excluding French Quebec), Africa (English speaking), Australia, or New Zealand. The University's TOEFL school code is 6681.

A minimum TOEFL score of 550 on the paper-based test (213 on the computer-based test or 81 on the Internet-based test) is required for admission to the Graduate College. There is no conditional admission for graduate students whose TOEFL scores are below these scores. Newly admitted graduate students who present TOEFL scores below 600 on the paper-based test (250 on the computer-based test, 100 on the Internet-based test) are required to complete an English proficiency evaluation before their first registration for classes. Some departments may require students to complete an English proficiency evaluation regardless of their TOEFL score. Students are required to complete any English as a Second Language course work (typically within the first year of study) specified as a result of the English proficiency evaluation.

English Language Instruction and Proficiency for Non-native Speakers

During the regular academic year, the University's Department of Linguistics offers credit-bearing English as a Second Language (ESL) courses for admitted students.

The University also sponsors a year-round, noncredit Iowa Intensive English Program (IIEP). Successful completion of IIEP, however, does not guarantee admission into the University. Students may begin IIEP studies in August, January, or May. Health Insurance

Insurance is needed to help cover the extremely high cost of medical care in the United States. Since it is imperative to have resources to cover costs of possible accidents or unexpected illnesses, international students at The University of Iowa are required to have health insurance. In addition, international students are strongly advised to provide health insurance for any dependents who will accompany them.

A reasonably priced group insurance plan with provisions for either individuals or families is available through the University. The cost ranges from \$840 per calendar year for a single student to \$4,380 per calendar year to cover a student, spouse, and children. Your prearrival information includes details about the group plan.

If you choose to purchase an insurance policy from another source, you must furnish evidence that your policy offers comparable coverage. Students who do not furnish such evidence are automatically billed for a University health insurance policy.

Finances and Employment

Since encountering financial difficulties poses particular problems to international students, the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) requires them to make arrangements, before leaving their own countries, to meet all financial needs they will encounter while they are in the United States, including transportation to and from Iowa City. This requirement is intended to help students avoid financial problems after their arrival in Iowa City. Students whose plans include fellowship or scholarship support from a sponsoring agency must complete all arrangements necessary to secure such support.

Financial Assistance

International students are not eligible for the financial aid programs administered by the Office of Student Financial Aid. Most financial assistance received by international students at the University is in the form of graduate teaching or research assistantships. U.S. embassies and binational cultural centers may provide information about other sources of financial assistance.

Employment Opportunities

Although it is possible to earn enough money to pay for room and board by working and living frugally, it is not possible to earn enough to pay for tuition.

Employment opportunities for students holding F-1 visas are limited by U.S. immigration regulations. F-1 students may work on campus (for the University) without having to obtain anyone's permission. Many students do so, but the number of on-campus jobs is limited, and the pay is usually about \$7 per hour. Most on-campus work involves either clerical or unskilled labor, such as positions in cafeterias, libraries, and hospital laboratories. F-1 students can work off campus only with governmental permission. Permission is difficult to obtain and is not granted during the first academic year of an international student's stay in the United States.

2005-2006 Estimated Costs

These costs are subject to change by the Board of Regents, State of Iowa.

Students with dependents who will accompany them should add approximately \$3,200 to the total costs figure for a spouse and \$2,100 for each child. In addition, students with children requiring full-time daycare should expect to pay more than \$120 per week for each child.
